The Truck Stops here

Food truck eatery coming to Central/Cooper, but goodbye Midtown Nursery

A hip new combination restaurant/food truck hub moving onto the corner of Cooper and Central is generating big buzz, though some neighbors are lamenting the loss of Midtown's only independent landscaping business and putting up a fight to try to save it.

Truck Stop is set to occupy the northwest corner next year. Taylor Berger, the driving force behind YoLo, Chiwawa and Tamp & Tap and founder of

Memphis Food Truck Association, said he'd been working on the concept for two years and searching for a location for six months before he called Loeb Properties about the corner lot, where Midtown Nursery's lease was set to expire in March.

"We looked up and saw that railroad and all those trees and said, 'Yeah that would be perfect," Berger said.

Inside an architect-designed space built from stacked, reclaimed shipping containers, a restaurant will serve small plates and desserts. But aside from the architecture, what sets Truck Stop apart will be the rotating daily selection of food trucks bringing a variety of foods to the corner, day and night, almost like a food court.

Berger hopes to operate the hub 24 hours a day, if he's able to keep it up. "I don't think we have enough 24-hour stuff in Memphis," he said.

Food truck hubs are already operating in other cities like Atlanta, but Berger said Truck Stop will be the first in the country to integrate the concept within a restaurant. About 40 diners can sit inside a seating area and bar, while picnic tables will seat about 100 outside.

Fresh Market to open on Union Ave.; Ike's closing

Midtown shoppers will finally get an upscale supermarket as Fresh Market prepares to move into the Ike's location at 2145 Union, the Commercial Appeal and other media outlets reported in November.

No date was given for the change, but a sign at Ike's indicated at least part of that store would be closing Dec. 31.

North Carolina-based Fresh Market will convert the existing building and make some landscaping changes around it, and intends to add space for two unspecified retail uses, according to a letter of intent filed with the Office of Planning and Development.

Fresh Market's opening comes as Kroger prepares to build a new, expanded store at its existing Union Avenue location, and shortly after improvements at Cash Saver's Madison Avenue location and Easy Way's Cooper Street location. Fresh Market has two area locations in East Memphis and Germantown.

Memphis Made offering new seasonal brews

Memphis' newest brewery is changing its lineup in order to keep the fresh ideas flowing.

Memphis Made Brew Company is unveiling two new beers, Fireside Ninja and Harvest Porter, which hit bars in November.

Brewed with a base of Munich malt and delicately steeped with Perle and Tettnanger hops, Fireside Ninja is malty on the front end with a slight hop finish on the back to provide balance. "With an ABV of 5.7 percent, this beer, while very accessible, will keep you warm on a fall night," the brewery said in a release.

Harvest Porter is a lighter than normal porter with a slight nuttiness and hints of chocolate. This beer style, created by Barton, consists of Marris Otter, chocolate and melanoidin malts balanced with East Kent Goldings and Fuggle hops. It should be available late next week.

The locally owned and operated craft brewery, which opened in early October, is rolling out its next set of limited edition inaugural beers. Parkways Pale Ale and South Cooper Saison will enjoy an early retirement, but may make an appearance again someday.

After experimenting with a few different styles of beer, the Cooper-Young brewery plans on making two styles, an IPA and a Kolsch, year-round. Those beers should come out in early 2014. Memphis Made will continue to make seasonal beers as production capacity allows.

Memphis Made Brewing Company is a small production brewery at 768 S. Cooper, right next to the "I Love Memphis" mural at Cooper and York.

It is lots of fun and a great way to share the Christmas spirit!



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

Family-friendly Winter Break destinations

The Parthenon, the Adventure Science Center, and Riverfront Park Ice Rink are also popular. Just south of Nashville is Franklin. The shipping container design, while innovative, has elicited confusion from some commenters online. Berger said the containers reflect the location's proximity to the freight railroad that still rumbles overhead above the lot, as well as Midtown's historic connection to the railroads and Memphis' status as a world shipping hub.

"I'm not doing just cause I think it's cool," Berger said. "I'm doing it because I think it tells a story and I think it will get Memphis a lot of press."

The small, awkward triangular lot on a busy corner could make parking a challenge, but Berger said after hearing comments from the community on the parking issue, his team tweaked the design to increase parking from 10 spaces to about 20.

He plans more community dialogue with Cooper-Young and Idlewild neighbors to make his vision fit with the neighborhood.

"The Truck Stop will not be a 'parking lot' for trucks, but rather an innovative structural design of inside/outside space using recycled shipping containers," wrote Truck Stop supporter Maria Levina of Memphis on a Facebook page debating the restaurant.

"Architecturally speaking it is actually rather neat and will serve CY community."

But an online petition to save current tenant Midtown Nursery garnered more than 100 signatures and some heated online commentary.

"This nursery is a great asset to this neighborhood; to Midtown in general. We need to promote independently owned and operated businesses," wrote Amy McDaniel of Memphis on the online petition site. "Also, there is not adequate parking for a food truck stop. This business would only aggravate an already congested intersection and create more of a hazard for cyclists and drivers alike."

Mike Earnest, owner of Midtown Nursery, said his first choice would be to stay in the corner location he has occupied since 2009, or move to a vacant lot across Central, but neither seems to be an option now. He is lin-

ing up temporary properties at Madison and McLean, and on Poplar near East High School, and said wherever he goes, he wants to keep his business in Midtown.

Berger will face the Memphis and Shelby County Board of Adjustment in December for a variance that will allow construction with shipping containers, but he said there's no slowing down the Truck Stop now.

"The restaurant will open no matter what," he said. "We're just hoping we can make it really special."

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

McWeeney's bold three-dimensional artwork that was so popular at the Art Auction really popped in our meeting space and brightened the area. We are looking forward to more art showings in 2014.

Halloween safety and fun – Signs were posted to remind trick-or-treaters to be safe while having fun. Neighbors joined the festivities by decorating their yards in hope of winning the coveted Great Pumpkin Award.

Holiday and Volunteer Thank You Party – The CYCA Board of Directors hosts this party for the entire community to honor the volunteers who work hard all year.

Holiday snack bags – Volunteers drop off homemade goods or pre-packaged snacks for the police and firefighters who work the night shift on Christmas Eve.

LampLighter – Year round, dedicated volunteers and a few key staff members put in numerous hours to bring the LampLighter to Cooper-Young residents. 


"We are trying to grow while maintaining our small town feel and service," Jennifer said.

Crimemapper allows you to input an address and search in quarter-mile increments for a specific type of crime. It then returns the results of your search for the previous 30 days.

THIS READING LIFE

'Santa Claus Conquers the Martians,' and other classics

I especially were tuned into the TV schedule of every Christmas themed movie. Some were regular: if my memory serves me right it went like this: Christmas Eve night was the Reginald Owen version of *A Christmas Carol*. Christmas night was *Miracle* on 34th Street and New Year's Eve was *It's a Wonderful Life*. And New Year's Day was *Holiday Inn*. Sometime, wedged in there among these classic nuggets was an odd holiday movie called *The Holly and the Ivy*. I can find few people today who remember *The Holly and the Ivy* but it was always my favorite. It was so ... existential. As if Sartre had written a holiday story. I could easily think I dreamed this movie — especially since it is currently unavailable on DVD — but I did manage to find an old VHS copy online, for which I paid dearly. It is now part of my own family's Christmas viewing.

If you remember the movies in a different order, on different nights, you can write and tell me if you want but I won't listen. I prefer to order my past this way. Ok?

Also, and my sister Sue will back me on this, at some point we added Santa Claus Conquers the Martians, one of the best worst movies ever made with its earworm theme song, "S-A-N-T-A

C-L-A-U-S, hooray for Santy Claus." Santy. (Not to be confused with Groucho's "Sanity Clause" joke.) Whatever song-penning whiz-kid concocted this gem was perhaps translating it from the Cyrillic alphabet.

And then, sometime later, a more mature, more recent classic was added: A *Christmas Story*. Wanna swap funny lines from it? I can do it all day long. "In the heat of battle my father wove a tapestry of obscenities that as far as we know is still hanging in space over Lake Michigan."

We'll skip over the ugly step-sisters of holiday movies: slasher films like *Black Christmas* (directed by the same guy who did *A Christmas Story*!) or *Santa Claws*. The makers of these films must be Scrooges or the products of mothers who did not breastfeed.

Ok, so this column is called "This Reading Life." I know. What I want to talk about here is the source materials for these treasured movies. Maybe most viewers don't even know the original sources. And I want to ponder this: Why are most of them are so dull?

Miracle on 34th Street comes from a short story by Valentine Davies. It is the bare bones of the story, written with very little style. It is more like a sketch for the finished painting of the movie. The same is true of *It's a Wonderful Life*, which comes from a blah story by Philip Van Doren Stern. *Even A Christmas Story*, which is from Jean Shepherd, one section from his novel, *In God We Trust, All Others Pay Cash*, is a disappointing read. This is surprising because it is Shepherd's beguiling voice-over in the movie which really makes the tone of the thing so delightful. The book is ... charming ... but it is not as much fun, nor as funny, as the movie.

Two are exempt: *Holiday Inn* is "based on an idea from Irving Berlin." And, my favorite, *The Holly and the Ivy*, is from a play by Wynward Browne.

Santa Claus Conquers the Martians is, believe it or not, from a short story by someone named Paul L. Jacobson. One can only assume that Mr. Jacobson, as a writer, was a better dentist, or bricklayer, or hot walker. Try this bit of dialogue from the film: "I wasn't sleeping, chief. It's just that I haven't been able to sleep these last few months. I forgot how. So I was just practicing." What?

This leads one to surmise that holiday movies are those rare instances of movies which are better than their books. There may be other fields like this (science fiction, occasionally? horror?).


We are on more solid ground, of course, with A Christmas Carol. The Dickens novella is every bit as powerful as any of the fine screen adaptations of it, if not more so. And Dylan Thomas' A Child's Christmas in Wales is a beautiful story, almost, but not quite, equaled by the screen version with Denholm Elliot (who is also in The Holly and the Ivy). Better perhaps than either of these is Chuck Jones' genius rendition of Dr. Seuss's genius How the Grinch Stole Christmas. I hope whoever thought to hire Boriss Karloff for the voice-over got a big bonus. (Don't get me started on Jim Carrey's criminal spoliation of Seuss, which is only just a chit above Mike Myers' criminal spoliation of Seuss [I'd like to slap the jerk]).

Anyway ... have a great holiday season. I apologize for not having any Kwanzaa or Hanukkah films in this column. Write it off to my ignorance.

I heard someone ask, what are you reading now, Corey? So I will tell you: Philip K. Dick's *The Three Stigmata of Palmer Eldritch*.
